All limited liability companies (LLC), limited partnerships (LP), and corporations that conduct business in Georgia are legally required to register with the Secretary of State.

☐ Get a Federal EIN (may not apply)

Depending on your situation, you may need to obtain a federal employer identification number (EIN) for tax purposes.

Open a Business Checking Account

A business checking account may help separate your personal and business assets, simplify filing business taxes, and make it easier to manage business-related finances.
